•Reading like a writer. When we read from the perspective of a writer, we focus less on what the writer is trying to say and more on how the writer is saying it. Specifically, we look at the techniques the writer is using to get his or her message across and how those techniques affect us as we experience the text.

Version "Full" Like a Reader, Like a Read

Reading like a writer requires the reader to analyze the basic elements of the writing (rhythm, sentence, paragraph, dialogue, gesture, etc.), break them down, critique each part, and reassemble them. It is similar to a mechanic disassembling an engine, knowing each part, and assembling the engine back again.
